



WMOC 2021 - COVID Update #2 15th March 2021

EVENT STATUS

WMOC 2021 is on track to be held.

ENTRY DEADLINES

The deadlines written in Bulletin 1 apply.

CURRENT ENTRY RESTRICTIONS INTO HUNGARY

Non-Hungarian citizens who are participants of an international sports event held in Hungary can enter the country with a negative SARS-CoV-2 PCR test not older than 3 days.

Budapest's Liszt Ferenc airport is open.

CURRENT ACCOMMODATION RESTRICTIONS

Participants of international sports events are allowed to be accommodated.

FURTHER RESTRICTIONS

- Curfew:
 - o from 20:00 to 05:00 everybody is required to stay indoors, whether at home, at a temporary home, or an accommodation.
 - o Competitive athletes are exceptions for reasonable travel (between airport - event venue - accommodation).
- Face masks are mandatory in public spaces
- Public areas, parks are open.
- Due to the 3rd wave of COVID-19, between 8th 22nd March, all shops are closed, except grocery stores, pharmacies, drugstores, tobacco stores and petrol stations. Also, all services must remain closed, except private healthcare, social, financial, postal, and vehicle repair services.
- Restaurants, cafés, bars, and clubs are closed. Only take-out and delivery service is permitted. Restaurants at hotels for those staying in the hotel remain open.
- Elite sport events can still be organised, but without spectators.





COVID NUMBERS IN HUNGARY (population of Hungary: appr. 10 million)

- Around 9,000 new cases daily.
- 152,296 active cases.
- 9,300 coronavirus patients are hospitalised.
- 1,334,595 people have been vaccinated (up from 981,401 one week ago), of which 398,962 have already received their second vaccination.

OUTLOOK

- On 8th March new restrictions were introduced in Hungary, which will be in force until 22nd March.
- The 3rd wave has begun in Hungary, the numbers are rising, the peak is expected in early April.
- The number of people vaccinated is growing constantly.
- The beginning of the Hungarian orienteering season had to be postponed due to the rapidly growing number of infected people.
